16mm Update.

hy 16mm? You may well ask! It has many advantages over both the larger scales (5" & 7.25" Gauges) and the smaller (4 & 7mm scales). When compared to the larger scales, our 16mm engines are smaller, cheaper and, most importantly, lighter. In fact most can be handled using just one hand. To prove this point one of our local group members quite often transports his models on the bus or train.

Steam powered locos have much in common with the larger scales, their construction is almost identical, apart from the boiler and weight. They need the same servicing before running (oiling, fuelling and watering), and will require the same skills when actually running on the track, particularly under radio control.

With regard to the smaller scales, yes, they are more likely to enjoy a more comfortable period of operation indoors during the winter months. They are fiddly to construct, hence most locos and rolling stock are bought in as complete items and due to greater demand are relatively cheaper than 16mm stock.

The joys of running on 16mm layouts designed to fit into the garden surrounded by miniature trees and alpine plants with like minded friends and families is great. So why not give 16mm a try? We operate the Littledown NG Garden Railway on the first and third Sundays of each month.

Several interesting models were seen including a Double Fairlie in 5" and a BR type standard 2-6-0,




albeit in a Britannia-like guise, also in 5"

Some months ago George Wheatly passed over to me a new Gordon Smith design of safety valve that he had made for Speedy. He had tested and set it on his *Polly* so it merely needed screwing into the boiler. Now that is what I like - many thanks George.

Another problem needing attention was a drive pin on one of the centre wheels which had worn badly. I had the brilliant idea of conning Derek Higbee into this tricky job, with profuse praise and reassurance that he could do it. Originally he declined but finally weakened. I think he just wanted to shut me up, so agreed to take it on. The problem was that the inside end of the pin had worn to two different diameters where one was eight thou bigger than the other. I didn't want to fit a new pin and lose the valve events on that side. Derek machined the shoulder off leaving me with one constant diameter, marvellous and a big thank you from me. I will leave it to Derek to tell you how he went about it.

The next job to be done is to machine two axle pump eccentric straps and mount them to pumps provided by Arnold Bloom last year. However, I am sure there are plenty of you who would like to do a nice little job like machining some eccentric straps to help the project along?

Boilers and CE Marking

The have just received an Information Sheet from the Southern Fed regarding the CE Marking of commercially made boilers built after 30th May 2002. This could have major implications for some of our Members and their boilers. If you have a boiler with a capacity greater than 2 litres that was made professionally after 30th May 2002 you will need to carefully check both the boiler and the paperwork supplied with the boiler.

The boiler should have been stamped with an Identification Number and the CE mark. It should also have been supplied with a document entitled 'Declaration of Conformity'. If you have a boiler that was made after the cut-off date, please check that it is stamped with the CE mark and you have the



correct paperwork. If it doesn't conform then we have been instructed that the boiler should never have been tested and that if you use it any insurance policy will be void.

If you have problems in finding the mark or the paperwork give either myself or Mike Mortimer a call.
